CALL TO ORDER AND PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

First Vice President Jenny Crosswhite called the meeting to order at 11:47 a.m. and asked Immediate

Past President Cindy Allen, Long Beach, RC District 30, to lead the pledge of allegiance.

Ruben Duran, Board Counsel, noted that Mayor Frank Navarro, RC District 6, would be participating through an accommodation under the Americans with Disabilities Act. He also announced the following members would be participating under the Just Cause provisions under the Brown Act:

PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD

First Vice President Crosswhite opened the Public Comment Period for persons to comment on any matter pertinent to SCAG's jurisdiction that were not listed on the agenda.

Ruben Duran, Board Counsel, acknowledged there was one written public comment related to RHNA Item 2 on the Consent Calendar.

The Clerk also acknowledged they had not received any Public Comment speakers cards from members of the public wishing to speak.

Seeing no public comment speakers for items not listed on the agenda, First Vice President Crosswhite closed the Public Comment Period.

REVIEW AND PRIORITIZE AGENDA ITEMS

There was no prioritization of agenda items.

CHAIR'S REPORT

Rocky Rhodes, Community, Economic, and Human Development Committee (CEHD) Chair, reported that the Committee was hard at work approving two action items and hearing one informational item on Connect SoCal 2024 Implementation Strategies. He noted that the first action item approved a recommendation to this body on the composition and approach for SCAG's forthcoming RHNA Subcommittee. He shared that Ma'Ayn Johnson, SCAG's Housing Department Manager, provided a presentation on the subcommittee process that informed the recommendation before them. He also reported that the CEHD heard an action item on SCAG's approach and methodology as it relates to Senate Bill 79. He explained that the bill was signed by Governor Newsom in 2025 and established new development and mapping requirements near transit-oriented development stops and zones. He noted that SCAG released its SB 79 methodology on May 22nd and the draft SB 79 map on June 1. He indicated that SCAG asked for corrections to be sent to staff by June 12, 2026.

There were no comments on the CEHD Chair report.

Rick Denison, Energy and Environment Committee (EEC) Chair, reported that there were four information items at the EEC. He stated the first update was on the progress implementing the Connect SoCal 2024 implementation strategies. He shared the second item focused on current and anticipated transportation conformity challenges in our region. He reported the third item was an update on the Innovative Clean Transit Regional Assessment study. He noted that the final item was a two-person panel that provided an overview on the evolving policy, water, and energy implications of AI data centers.

There were no comments on the EEC Chair report.

Mike T. Judge, Transportation Committee (TC) Chair, reported that the Transportation Committee took action to appoint a new Vice Chairman to the Committee. He noted that Regional Council Member Steven Ly, Rosemead, District 32, was appointed to serve out the term vacated by Regional Council Member Thomas Wong. He thanked Regional Council Member Wong and congratulated Regional Council Member Ly. He also reported that the Committee heard three informational items. He noted the first item was an update to the committee from LaDonna DeCamillo, Interim Director of Planning and Sustainability at the High-Speed Rail Authority, on the California High-Speed Rail Authority's ongoing work and release of the Authority's Draft 2026 Business Plan. He stated the second item was an update from SCAG staff on the Connect SoCal 2024: Implementation Strategies and indicated that the strategies include ways in which SCAG continues to lead, partner, and support members and stakeholders as they implement the vision and goals of Connect SoCal as they work towards Connect SoCal 2028. He stated the last update was provided on the SCAG Southern California Airport Access and Mobility Study. He indicated that SCAG was supporting a regional airport access analysis in advance of the future "Mega Events" coming to Southern California. He explained that the study was designed to support improved planning and management of surface transportation systems connecting airports to the regional multimodal network.

There were no comments on the TC Chair report.

ACTION ITEM

1. Approval of Amendment No. 5 to Executive Director's Employment Agreement

Mr. Duran, Board Counsel, reported that on page 10 of the agenda packet, they were recommending Regional Council approval of an amendment to the Executive Director's Employment Agreement following a positive performance review conducted by the Executive Administration Committee in April. He stated that the proposed amendment includes extending the contract term from April 2027 to May 31, 2029, and a 5% salary increase in recognition of the Executive Director's strong

performance. He noted that all other terms of the agreement remain unchanged. He also noted that, if approved, the Executive Director's base annual salary would increase to \$433,784.

There were no public comments on Item No. 1.

A MOTION was made (Ramos) to approve the attached Amendment No. 5 to the Employment Agreement between SCAG and Kome Ajise to adjust the Executive Director's Salary in response to a positive performance review, approve the Annual Work Plan for 2026-27, and extend the term of the Employment Agreement to May 31, 2029. 2. 7th Regional Housing Needs Assessment Process and Subcommittee

Ma'Ayn Johnson, Housing Department Manager, presented an overview of the 7th Regional Housing Needs Allocation (RHNA) cycle and a recommended approach for forming a RHNA Subcommittee. She explained that RHNA was a state-mandated, eight-year planning process that determines and distributes regional housing needs across all jurisdictions by income category, requiring local governments to plan for housing through their housing elements. She outlined key statutory objectives, including increasing housing supply and diversity, promoting infill development and socioeconomic equity, protecting environmental resources, improving the jobs-housing balance, and affirmatively furthering fair housing. She described the roles of HCD and SCAG, recent legislative changes accelerating the timeline, and anticipated next steps, including receipt of the regional housing determination, development and approval of the methodology, and completion of allocations and appeals by October 2028. She also noted that the proposed subcommittee structure expands membership to improve regional representation, with appointments made by the SCAG President and primarily drawn from CEHD and Regional Council members. She asked the Regional Council to authorize the creation of a RHNA Subcommittee to support development of the methodology and allocation plan, provide recommendations to the CEHD Committee and Regional Council, and serve as the final hearing body for RHNA appeals, with membership composition, quorum, and voting procedures as described in the staff report.

Regional Council Members raised questions and concerns regarding the RHNA process, methodology, and proposed subcommittee structure. Comments included inquiries about the transparency of the State’s housing determination process and the extent of local and regional input, with staff emphasizing ongoing efforts to share information publicly and engage with HCD. Several members expressed concerns about the proposed subcommittee composition, particularly the need for broader and more balanced representation within larger and more diverse counties such as Los Angeles. Additional discussion focused on the likelihood of increased housing allocations in the 7th cycle, with members questioning the assumptions driving projected growth, including the consideration of homelessness, migration trends, and economic factors. Concerns were also raised about infrastructure capacity, job-housing balance, and the impact of large allocations on quality of life and regional planning. Members highlighted the importance of reviewing historical RHNA outcomes, ensuring equitable distribution across regions, and examining how state policies and constraints affect local implementation. Interest was expressed in participating on the subcommittee and in conducting deeper analysis of methodology development, timelines, and the broader implications of RHNA decisions for future regional planning.

There were no public comments on Item No. 2.

A MOTION was made (Doby) that the Regional Council authorize the formation of the 7th Cycle RHNA Subcommittee to support the development of the RHNA methodology and allocation plan, provide recommendations to the CEHD Committee and Regional Council, and serve as the final hearing body for RHNA appeals, with membership composition, quorum, and voting procedures as described in the staff report. INFORMATION ITEM

11. Quarterly Economic Update

Kevin Kane, Planning Supervisor of the Demographics and Growth Vision Program, provided introductory remarks, noting that SCAG typically delivers quarterly economic updates through its Economic Roundtable, but this was currently between reporting cycles due to a three-year re-procurement process. In lieu of the standard update, Dr. Kane introduced Dr. Gigi Moreno, former SCAG economist, who departed in 2024 and now served as an independent economist and Chief Economist for the California Energy Commission's Department of Petroleum Market Oversight, to present a special economic update for the region.

Dr. Moreno presented the SCAG Regional Quarterly Economic Update, covering employment, housing, and the broader economic outlook. She reported that the region's unemployment rate remains stable at 5 percent; however, this stability reflects simultaneous declines in both employment and labor force participation, indicating potential underlying weakness driven by workforce exits and out-migration. She reported that total payroll employment decreased modestly by approximately 20,000 jobs year-over-year, with losses concentrated in Orange and Los Angeles Counties, while the Inland Empire and Imperial County experienced slight gains. She noted that structural factors such as shrinking labor force participation and the impact of AI on hiring, particularly in professional and technical sectors, were contributing to slower job growth, though healthcare and social assistance remain key growth sectors. She shared that in contrast, housing production showed strong momentum, with over 19,000 units permitted through April 2026, a 43 percent increase from the prior year, led by significant activity in Los Angeles County and the City of Los Angeles, suggesting policy-driven progress. She shared that looking ahead, economic headwinds including immigration policy, global conflict, and tariffs were expected to constrain employment growth through 2026, with stronger growth projected in 2027–2028. She stated inflation remained a concern, with regional prices up 3.4 percent year-over-year and fuel costs rising sharply, increasing household expenses despite relatively greater resilience compared to other states. Overall, she stated the region faced stable but stagnant employment conditions, improving housing production, and ongoing cost pressures affecting residents.

Member Warren inquired about which housing policies were contributing to the recent increase in housing production. Dr. Moreno deferred to Kevin Kane, who explained that the notable rise in permitting was largely driven by a significant surge in the City of Los Angeles' housing permit activity, particularly in the first quarter of the year. He explained that further review and discussions with City staff indicated that this increase was not fully attributable to factors such as wildfire recovery but was more likely associated with the full implementation of the Citywide Housing Element Implementation Program (CHIP) throughout 2025, which had seen strong uptake. Mr. Kane noted that while this conclusion was based on a primary data source, the magnitude of the increase was substantial and suggests that the policy was meaningfully contributing to regional housing trends.

BUSINESS REPORT

First Vice President Crosswhite reported that Lucy Dunn had ended her tenure as the business representative and wished her well. She noted that the new business representative was going to be Paul Granillo, who could not be at the meeting, but they would do a proper introduction at the July meeting.

There was no business report.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

President Marquez welcomed new Regional Council members Tanya Doby (Los Alamitos, District 20), Ardy Kassakhian (Glendale, District 42), Jim Light (Redondo Beach, District 40), Steve Ly (Rosemead, District 32), and Paul Granillo (Business Representative). He expressed appreciation to all who attended the 2026 Regional Conference and General Assembly, which brought together over 900 regional leaders in Palm Desert and featured panel discussions and keynote speakers. He also highlighted that the city of Riverside received top honors in the 2026 Sustainability Awards. He also reported leading a delegation of Regional Council members and SCAG staff to Washington, D.C., where they held 21 meetings advocating for federal priorities including surface transportation reauthorization, funding for the 2028 Summer Olympic and Paralympic Games, and housing, and concluded with the annual California Congressional Transportation Reception co-hosted with the Metropolitan Transportation Commission. He reported the next Regional Council meeting was scheduled for July 2, 2026, and expressed appreciation of First Vice President Jenny Crosswhite for chairing the meeting.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Kome Ajise, Executive Director, thanked the Regional Council for approving his contract extension and expressed appreciation for the opportunity to continue serving the region and leading SCAG staff. He reported that the CEHD Committee approved the proposed methodology and approach for implementing SB 79, which requires SCAG to develop and maintain transit-oriented development maps. Jeff Elder, Chief Legal Counsel, clarified that the map would be live by the deadline of July 1 and that the methodology would be presented to the Regional Council for approval on July 2. He emphasized they would be in compliance with the requirement to have the map by July 1. Mr. Ajise noted that the public correction period would be open through mid-June. He explained that Los Angeles County was currently the only county in the region subject to SB 79 requirements, though additional counties may qualify in the future. He also provided an update on Connect SoCal implementation strategies. He highlighted the advancement on 84 of 93 strategies since adoption in April 2024, including regional coordination to prepare for increased travel demand tied to the 2026 FIFA World Cup and the 2028 Olympic and Paralympic Games; Regional Council approval of Surface Transportation Block Grant and Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality funding recommendations; publication of the 2026 State of the Region Report and Regional Resilience Toolkit; and the launch of the Smart Cities Strategic Plan effort. He also reported that he participated in the ribbon cutting of the Calexico Intermodal Transportation Center, a project supported by SCAG through \$1 million in REAP 2.0 funding, which brings mobility, safety, and sustainability benefits to Imperial County. He indicated that SCAG had been a partner on this project for more than a decade, including funding a 2014 feasibility study with Caltrans, Imperial County Transportation Commission, and the city of Calexico to identify and evaluate the project site. He also reported that on June 8, SCAG would release the SoCal Greenprint tool. He indicated SoCal Greenprint was an optional, flexible, and open conservation-focused data mapping tool that supports regional advanced mitigation planning

initiatives. He explained this tool was a response to their planning efforts to make sure that they provide enough information for folks to make decisions as they get into project development. He shared that the Energy and Environment Committee would receive a presentation on SoCal Greenprint at their July meeting. Finally, he reminded members that SCAG's federally required certification review process was underway, with a public comment period open through June 15, and encouraged broad participation to help inform and improve agency processes.

Regional Council Member Mike Goodsell, ICTC, thanked Mr. Ajise for attending the Calexico ribbon cutting event.

There were no public comments on the Business, President's or Executive Director's reports.

FUTURE AGENDA ITEMS

There were no future agenda items.

ANNOUNCEMENTS
